## Lecture Series has begun

The SRHF and the San Ramon Library Foundation have partnered to provide the community with a free series of lectures on the history of the San Ramon Valley. The first lecture was given by Beverly Lane, Curator of the Museum of the San Ramon Valley. Her informative description of the evolution of agriculture from the Indians to suburbia provided the audience with a clear picture of the valley and its agricultural history. The lecture was given at Forest Home Farms in the tractor barn, the perfect venue for the subject.

Currently, two additional lectures are scheduled. **Early Life of Native Americans**, with speaker Andrew Galvan, will be presented on Novem-

ber 9<sup>th</sup>, 7:00 pm at the San Ramon Library. He will explore the life of California Indians who lived in the San Francisco East Bay.

On January 18<sup>th</sup> at 7:00pm, Dr. Gregorio Mora-Torres will discuss **Spanish-Mexican History**. He will examine missionary activities, early settlement, land grants and California Anglo-American interaction. This lecture will be held at the Dougherty Station Community Center. The valley's history is a great story, and our knowledgeable speakers will provide all of us with a new way to look at the San Ramon Valley. Come and gain new insights to share with your children, or for teachers, your students.

## Seventh Annual Victorian Tea



The Afternoon Victorian Tea has been a premier city event for the past six years. This year the San Ramon Historic Foundation sponsored the Tea.

It is no longer a City event. Everyone is urged to wear a Victorian costume and/or hat. Prizes are awarded to the best dressed. This year the well deserved prize went to Barbara Phipps, a long time resident of San Ramon. She made the 2 piece outfit and hat that dazzled the judges.

With 200 guests attending the tea this year, the foundation raised approximately \$6,000 to benefit Forest Home Farms. In addition, the foundation made and sold Victorian hats, etched ornaments, and videos of Ruth Boone talking about life on Forest Home Farms.

All the food is now catered, and each year the tea committee decides on a souvenir representative of the Victorian era for each guest to take home. This year, guests were given Hershey chocolate bars, which were introduced in 1900, with a label telling about Ruth Boone.

Entertainment has varied from a display and presentation on hand made quilts, to this year's presentation, performances by two Barber Shop style singing groups.

Each year the community looks forward to Mrs. Boone's Afternoon Victorian Tea. Hosted in her memory, it recognizes the great legacy that she donated to the City of San Ramon, her 16 acre family farm, Forest Home Farms. We hope it will continue to be a popular event.
