Update on the Glass House

Jeff Eorio, Director of the San Ramon Parks & Community Services, came to a recent board meeting to discuss the city's progress in restoring the Glass House. It is very apparent from San Ramon Valley Road that crews are busy inside and outside. Drive by to see the new landscaping which is suggested by vintage pictures of the Glass House.

The Italianate Victorian House was built in 1877 on land purchased by David Glass in 1859 (part of the Jose Maria Amador Land Grant) from James Dougherty. It was sold to the Elissando family in 1932 and has seen many uses since. It was a French restaurant, Sunny Hill Rest Home, a Montessori school and an antique shop. In 1998, it was donated to the city and moved a short distance down San Ramon Valley Road to its current location on the Boone property.

What can't be seen from the road is the work going on inside the house. New wiring, plumbing, cooling and heating sys-

tems are being installed and the walls restored. The interior of the house should be completed early fall of 2007. At that point everyone who has purchased a stone piece to support the Glass House and received a certificate will be invited to an empty house party. The San Ramon Historic House Museum will soon be a reality with groups such as the SRHF and the Dublin/San Ramon Women's Club working to raise money to furnish the home. The San Ramon Rotary Club also made a significant donation designated for the Glass House.

Inside the Glass House will be a room designated as the gift shop and run by the SRHF. When the gift shop is open, drop by to see some unique items and perhaps sign up as a volunteer!



Successful Lecture Series Continues

The SRHF and the San Ramon Library Foundation are sponsoring a series of free lectures on the history of the San Ramon Valley. The November 9th lecture, **Early Life of Native Americans**, with speaker Andrew Galvan was at the San Ramon Library. Mr. Galvan discussed the life of California Indians of the San Francisco East Bay.

On January 18th Dr. Gregorio Mora-Torres will discuss **Spanish-Mexican History**. He will examine missionary activities, early settlement, land grants and California Anglo-American interaction. Dr. Mora-Torres, a professor at San Jose State University, has recently published his translation of the reflections of Jose Maria Amador. Amador was granted Rancho San Ramon by the Mexican government; the 20,000 acre ranch included
